

When our daughter Natalia was born with two fingers on her left hand we figured, "this is God's will; we'll be just fine." We assumed the love and support of our family would be enough, and it was, until we walked into our first Hand Camp. The old saying, "You don't know what you don't know," hit us hard as we saw children, babies, adults, and teenagers who had hands and arms that looked like Natalia's hand! We met people from EVERYWHERE and we had flown from Vermont to be there, too! We met people with all kinds of limb differences, and they could do EVERYTHING! We watched Natalia beam as she met our Family Pal and started to learn all about the adventures that awaited her over the next two days.


Natalia was six years old when we experienced the magic of our first Hand Camp. While she had the best time meeting new friends, learning archery, climbing

the courses, meeting the Robotics Team and learning all about the cool stuff they do, and on and on... It was my husband, Chris, and I who learned and experienced the most.

During our parent sessions we learned about advocating for our daughter's education in a way that had never occurred to us. We learned how other parents handled their children's anxiety surrounding their differences. But, most of all, we learned the power of bringing together all of these amazing, inspiring people so that one thing is perfectly clear: difference does not equal disability!

We missed Camp the next two years during COVID and were ecstatic to return to Gainesville last spring for Camp. Natalia had been struggling with anxiety in school and was hiding her hand under hoodies. (We had since moved to Florida after our last Hand Camp visit!) She was now nine years old, and we were working with counselors at her school, her teachers, and we were "throwing the book" at her struggles with little progress.

Then, we went to Camp. Our Family Pal, Olivia, took to Natalia immediately and made her feel like the only person at camp! They played endless games of Gaga Ball, did all the arts and crafts, sat in the front row at the talent show, and Olivia was Natalia's loudest cheerleader at every event at camp! She was also amazing with Natalia's precocious little sister, Cece - which was no small feat! Natalia made a great friend in the sibling of a camper, who joined in on the fun with Natalia and Olivia. When we returned from camp, Natalia flourished in school and in soccer. Her teachers and counselors saw a leap in her confidence. Natalia even asked for a huge box to put her hoodies in. Our family has been so blessed to be a part of the magic that is Hand Camp. We cannot wait to attend this year!

I give to help foster the little moments that have a big impact throughout Hand Camp. Watching a camper or sibling offer words of encouragement to a friend frustrated with a camp activity, hearing a parent share advice on how to optimize school resources for their child, and seeing the looks of joy and excitement when a camper gets to try something new--these are the moments that make Hand Camp so special.

Personally, as a surgeon, it's often tempting to get lost focusing on the technical and medical components of patient care. My Hand Camp experience has given me a better understanding and appreciation for the

BAG DESIGN CONTEST FOR HAND CAMP 2023


CHALLENGE: Create a graphic design based on our theme song, "This is Me" from the musical The Greatest Showman to be printed on our Hand Camp '23 bag.
